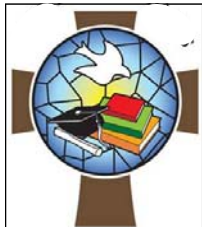

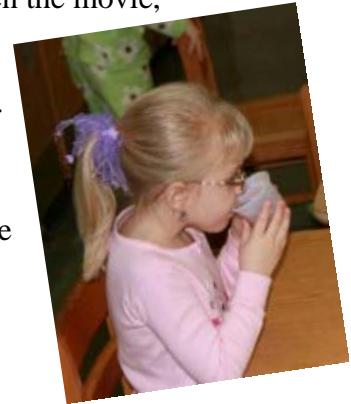

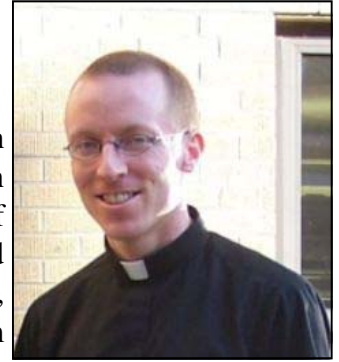

Chaplain's Chat

As we celebrate Catholic Schools Week, I've been thinking about my own education and involvement with Catholic schools. I attended Delphos St. John in kindergarten and then later from 7th grade through high school. I lived in the small village of Landeck (located 5 miles southwest of Delphos – my parents are still there) and attended the small public elementary school about a tenth of a mile from home, which is part of Delphos City Schools. Almost directly across the street from Landeck Elementary, is my home parish, Landeck St. John the Baptist.



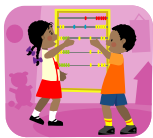
Landeck Elementary is not your average public school. School officially ends at 2:30. While some students then go home for the day, the Catholics stay until 3:15 for the CCD religion class offered by St. John the Baptist parish (at least when I attended a large majority of kids stayed). Classes are taught right in the school building itself by parish volunteers, and students attend Mass once per week across the street. It's known as a "release time" religion program.

While Landeck Elementary may sound like a quasi-Catholic school, my experience there was very different from mine here at St. Paul, at St. John, and in other Catholic schools. On the surface level, we did not wear uniforms and of course there were no crucifixes or religious imagery in the classrooms. Our religious formation was very segregated and relegated to the end of the day. The atmosphere of the school was very different; it was not permeated with the faith like it is at Catholic schools where we have the great gift of sharing and experiencing our faith throughout the school day. The integration of the faith and greater attentiveness to God's presence throughout the school day has made a great impact on me.

I am thankful for my time at Landeck Elementary, yet my time at Delphos St. John had a greater impact in my life, especially in my religious formation and education. I probably did not fully appreciate it at the time, though. I did notice more of a family atmosphere in the Catholic school, of course along with all of the tangible differences mentioned above. While my faith did grow there, I realize that my formation planted the seeds of a deeper faith which grew a little later on in my life. Of course, my parents also helped to nurture this faith with their support of the school and the example of their lives. They helped to reinforce what I was learning and experiencing at school. They were deeply aware of their responsibility to be the first teachers of me and my siblings, to not allow there to be a disconnect between life in the home and life at school.

The year before I entered the seminary, I worked as a substitute teacher. I subbed at both public and Catholic schools, yet I enjoyed my time in the Catholic schools more. I again appreciated the atmosphere of faith that permeated the schools along with the tangible signs of our faith. Then later as a seminarian during my pastoral internship at Findlay St. Michael, one of my greatest joys was my involvement with the school there. Of course, here at St. Paul High School and Junior High and Norwalk Catholic School, I am very happy and thankful to be chaplain.

We can give thanks and celebrate the blessings of who we are as a Catholic school during this special week. We should also give thanks to our parishes and benefactors for generously supporting our school. This year's theme for Catholic Schools Week is Dividends for Life: Faith, Knowledge, Discipline, and Morals. We can also be thankful that we can integrate these four areas, but we know it can always be done better. I know that they have come together for me and greatly impacted my life from my own experience. I hope and pray that as supporters and school families we will realize the blessings of our school and do our best to let our faith in Jesus Christ shine through our own lives so that we can advance in our mission of developing disciples. May God bless us all in our efforts to do so.

LIFE: Learning In a Faithfilled Environment

Norwalk Catholic School teachers, Debra Schlotterer, Mary Kay Mollaun, and Deb Scavuzzo attended the LIFE Training class on November 5, 2009 in Toledo, OH. The first session of a three part series focused on the first section of our Credo: "We believe our Catholic School is not only a school, but a community of Faith." With this in mind, teachers from all over the Diocese, from primary through high school, listened to talks presented by various Diocesan representatives, met together in small groups to discuss the talks and how what was learned could be implemented in our schools and classrooms, and were given hands-on suggestions as to how to do this.

One activity in particular was quite well received by many. This activity, coming from one of the speakers, was "How to pray with your students in 5 minutes or less." Some of the suggestions were: read a Chicken Soup story, Post-It Note prayer, God Tube video, one-word intercessory prayer, and artwork. Volunteers were given the task of the one-word intercessory prayer. It was a way to get the children to focus on ONE THING they wanted to pray for. We also, as a group, did the Post-It note prayer. Our prayers were stuck to the wall in the meeting room. As the day wore on, some of the Post-Its fell, and our leader told us that these were the prayers that God had answered which was kind of a neat thing to think about.

I found this to be an exhilarating and faith-filled experience. To be able to meet and talk with other Catholic school teachers and share their thoughts and ideas was nothing short of amazing! I am looking forward to our next meeting which will be in Findlay, OH on January 5, 2010.

Celebrating the Year of the Priest

To help celebrate the "Year of the Priest", Mrs. Ware's 5th grade class wrote letters to 4 seminarians in the Toledo Diocese. Before the letters were sent, Mrs. Ware discussed with her class what it would be like to study for the priesthood. Students wondered if their lives were similar. The class brainstormed different ideas and questions they could put into their letters.

The four names were then divided up between the students so each seminarian would receive about 13 letters. Students gave a little information about themselves and then asked questions to the seminarians. "This gave them the chance to write in a "real world" setting, instead of just writing for me."

Within two weeks, the students received a response. The first response was in the form of a letter sent back from one of the seminarians. The second response came with a knock on the door announcing that a seminarian, Jerry Schetter, was here to visit the class and answer their questions in person! For the next hour, the students learned a little bit about seminarian life, but more importantly got to meet the person they had sent a letter to.

Max Hemingford, "It was interesting, it made me think about the life of the priests." Alex Hoty, "I thought it was kind of him to share his time with us." “No Name-Calling Week” is an annual week of educational activities aimed at ending name-calling of all kinds and providing schools with the tools and inspiration to launch an on-going dialogue about ways to eliminate bullying in their communities. This is a national effort.

The teachers have been provided with lesson plan ideas to use in their classroom as well as other resources that might help them in their effort to stop name-calling in their classroom.

Some of the lesson ideas include knowing the difference between put-ups and put-downs, role-plays, staying safe in the face of name-calling, speaking out against name-calling, and building a bully free building.

An easy way to continue this effort at home would be to read books with your elementary school child that discussed name-calling. Some suggestions are:

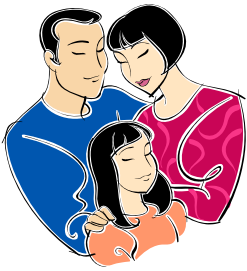
